

2024 Piggy Bank Design Contest Official Rules

CONTEST DESCRIPTION: Kentucky youth are asked to celebrate Kentucky Saves Week by using their creativity to make a piggy bank.

ELIGIBILITY: Contest is open only to school students attending public, private, or home school located within the Commonwealth of Kentucky

HOW TO ENTER: To enter the Contest, eligible youth ("Entrants") must:

enrolled in kindergarten through twelfth grade.

- Create an original piggy bank design as described under Contest Timing and Entry Requirements.
- Submit Entry and Official Entry Form to Your Local County Cooperative Extension Office. Your County Extension Office Contact Information may be obtained at http://extension.ca.uky.edu/county. Entries must be delivered to the Cooperative Extension Office by: 01/12/24
- Winning Entries at the area level must be selected by February 8, 2024

CONTEST TIMING:

Submit Entry by deadline, Must be submitted by: 01/12/24 to your local county extension office, Each Entry

to your local county extension office. Each Entry must be accompanied by an official Entry Form.

One (1) Entry per person during the Contest period in the event more than one (1) Entry is received from any one person, the first Entry processed will be considered the only valid Entry and subsequent Entries from the same person will be disqualified.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS: Entries must meet the following requirements to be eligible for judging:

- The bank cannot exceed
 inches X 12 inches X 12 inches
 (1 square foot).
- b. Piggy banks must be able to hold coins (i.e., include a slot that has been cut to insert coins).
- c. Piggy banks must be created or decorated by the youth contestant.
 d. Plastic or ceramic banks piggy banks may be used, but must be personally

decorated.

- Piggy banks DO NOT have to be in the shape of a pig.
- You MAY use or repurpose other containers.
- g. Piggy banks must be submitted and judged through the local Cooperative Extension Office. In addition, an Entry shall be void if it

JUDGING CRITERIA/WINNER SELECTION

AND VERIFICATION: Entries will be judged within Extension Areas by a panel of judges coordinated by the Area piggy bank delegate. Each panel of judges will select one (1) winning Entry for a possible total of 12 winners statewide — 4 per Extension Region. The judges will review all Entries and select the winners based on the following criteria: originality, creativity, artistic design, and attractiveness. Judging of Entries and the determination of the winners will be completed by:

The winner's name, grade, county, and winning Entry may be displayed at the State Capitol in Frankfort.



THIS MONTH'S TOPIC:

STAY FIRE SAFE



hen it gets cold in the winter, many people turn to fire to stay warm and have light. From candles to fireplaces and heaters, fires can help people be comfortable. However, fire is very serious, is never a toy, and is never OK to touch.

Every year, kids of all ages start fires that hurt people and damage things. You can do your part to prevent fires by never playing with matches, lighters, and other fire sources. Also stay away from all open flames, including fireplaces, candles, and stoves. If you are worried about one of these items, always talk to a grown up in your home. Do not investigate for yourself.

Even when people try to be safe, accidents can still happen. Some

people don't want to talk about fire safety because no one likes to think about people getting hurt or their things getting burned. But you can feel less worried about a fire if you are ready just in case.

All homes should have a fire escape plan. They should include how to get out of your home in case of a fire and where to meet outside. Smoke from a fire can make it hard to see where things are, so it's important to learn and remember the different ways out of your home. Talk to your family about the different ways to get out of the rooms in your home. The most important thing in a fire is to get out safely. Never try to hide.

If you can see smoke in the house, stay low to the ground as you go to the exit. In a fire, smoke and poisonous air hurt more people than the actual flames do. You'll breathe less smoke if you stay close to the ground. Bend down low or crawl to avoid the smoke and keep going quickly to the outside.

Besides planning how to get out, you also need to know where to meet your family outside. This is helpful because then everyone shows up in one place and you'll know that everyone is safe. It is normal to worry about your pets or a favorite toy, but if there is a fire, you have to leave them behind. The most important thing is that you get out safely. Once you are out, STAY OUT. Do not go back in for anything — even pets. You can tell the fire rescue people about any pets that were left behind and they may be able to help.





If you are stuck in a room with a hot door or on an upper floor, keep the door closed and get to a window. Open it if you can and make a lot of noise and move around. Firefighters will be able to see you and help you get down.

If your clothes ever catch fire, do not run away! Instead, cut off air to the fire by remembering to STOP, DROP to the ground, cover your face with your hands, and ROLL to put out the flames.

You do not need to be afraid of fire. You can make good choices to keep your distance and stay safe.



Build Your Own Ramen

Servings: 2 Serving Size: 12 ounces







Ingredients:

- 1 package of any flavor ramen noodles
- 2 cups of water
- 5 oz of canned or packaged chicken or tuna
- 1 cup mixed vegetables or vegetable of your choice
- Seasoning of your choice (garlic powder, onion powder, Italian seasoning, lemon pepper or all-purpose seasoning.)

Directions:

- 1. Prepare ramen in a microwave (or stovetop) according to package instructions.
- Add chicken or tuna and vegetables and heat for 30 seconds to 1 minute in the microwave until heated through.
- 3. Note: if using the seasoning packet included in the package, try using only half of the flavor packet and adding your own spices.
